Listen: Meih haaix nyungc zoux? - why (did you do that)?

Dafing is a language of Burkina Faso. It is also known as Marka.

Greeting: Zirin zirin! - story story! Response: zirin! - story!

Listen: chani - beautiful bishi - charm anitche - thank you furo muso nkey yem na - married woman, pay attention to your behavior
